A Word From The Pastor

Hello Beloved.

Jesus was sent to a time and place where His people were being oppressed in their own country by a ruthless system of government that favored the citizens of that empire but trampled on the rights of the other people living in the empire. Jesus was part of a marginalized group because of the tribe he had been born (SENT- important word) into.

At that time there was a group of people called Zealots. The Zealots were "freedom fighters" in Judea, they were people who wanted this oppressive system of government gone and replaced by their own rule. They were so opposed to this system that had them marginalized to the point that their lives didn't really matter to the powers that be, that they would riot and demonstrate. History tells us that Roman soldiers did not travel alone in Jerusalem because the Zealots did not travel alone and if they could they would drag a Roman soldier into an alley and slit their throats. These people were committed to their cause. Well, in 66 AD/CE they got their wish, they had a full out rebellion against this tyrannical government ruling in their country.

Now, I say rebel, and not revolt because a revolution succeeds in the change they want to see and a rebellion does not. That's right, they lost. They did have some success in the early part, but finally they were crushed in 70 AD/CE (Though Masada held out until 73 AD/CE). Not only did they not win, they lost their country and didn't get it back for another 1,878 years. I think it's fair to say that their way did not work.

Remember I said that Jesus was alive during part of this time (before the rebellion) when the Zealots were trying to have their voices heard through different types of civil disobedience. So, here is the question, WWJD? OR more so, what DID Jesus do? Surely, He saw the injustices happening around Him. He saw his fellow country people being brutalized and even killed. He didn't' just see it, He lived it.

Not one riot or demonstration against Rome, not even an organized peaceful protest. Jesus understood that there was another way. He told of another Kingdom in which ALL could be citizens. However, this Kingdom does not play by the same rules as all the governments in this world play. This Kingdom was based on Unselfishness, Love, Acceptance, Hope, Joy, Peace, and yes Justice for all. Its reign does not come from any physical form that we comprehend, in fact, it has been and is already here. We choose to not see His Kingdom because we want to play by the rules that this world has given us or that we have given each other. Jesus understands that no laws, or systems of government that this world can create can achieve what God has already given to us. history does teach us that.

In that way we are a lot of Zealots, huh?! You know the cool thing? Jesus had a Zealot in his 12. Simon, the Zealot. Something else, remember they didn't travel alone, wanna bet He had at least one more? Lots of fingers point to Judas, it would explain a lot. Hey, how do you think Simon felt working alongside Matthew, the Roman tax collector, who had sold out to the system? Jesus showed Simon a different way and Simon spent the rest of his life trying to show others God's Kingdom. Well, anyway, that might be cool and all, but here is the hard part – helping others (or ourselves) to see this other Kingdom – this other way. You see, it takes time, it happens, usually from one heart to another. It happens when those of us who do see this Kingdom actually live as though we are citizens of that Kingdom and not of any in this world. When people see us living this way it helps them to see this other Way. When we live like citizens of this world it just confuses people. It is hard to live this different Way, so God gives us His Living Spirit to help us (if we listen). Even then, we aren't perfect so we forgive and ask for forgiveness (which is another cool part of God's Kingdom). Trust me. I know it is hard to live as a citizen of God's Kingdom, and it's even harder to help others to see it. I think that's why we (Christians) tend to act like Zealots too much, because like a few of the 12, we want to see this change in a way that we understand, and we want to see it happen for all, right now, so we try to tell Jesus to make His Kingdom come now, missing that it is already here. Here is a punch to the gut, personally; I believe that is what Judas was trying to get Jesus to do when he betrayed Jesus. In that scenario Judas thought he was doing the right thing, but he did not understand. I know I have been guilty of doing that myself.

Racism is not the cause, it is a symptom. It is a symptom of fear, but fear is not the cause, fear is also a symptom. Fear is a symptom of selfishness. We can treat the symptom, just like we treat the symptom of a cold, and it will make us feel better for a time, but it will come back until we treat the cause. Jesus understood this truth, which is why He showed us, His followers, how to change our selfish hearts and then how to help others to change theirs. That IS His Kingdom, that is the other Way, a world where no selfish heart exists. His Kingdom has come, may we be open to seeing it, and courageous enough to live as its citizens.

Church Council

The JCUMC Church Council met on Thursday June 11 at the church with 8 members present. Pastor Stephen opened the meeting with a devotion and prayer. The Scripture verse was from Romans 12:9-10.

Wendy and Jack gave the financial reports for the church and the FLC. Wendy asked the council for permission to move the payroll to a company who specializes in working with churches. Motion was made and passed unanimously. Wendy let council know that the computer in the sanctuary has been paid off, and that apportionments are being caught up after the shutdown. Brent moved and Ron seconded to approve all the financial reports, motion passed.

Finance committee report was given by Ed, as Todd was not able to attend. Discussion was had about the property next door, it is estimated that we will gain 20-25 parking spaces once the house is gone. The district committee has approved us purchasing the property, that letter is on file in the office. There was also discussion on which kind of mortgage the church should get for the property, it was

decided that that decision should be made by the finance committee.

Todd brought it to Ed's attention that the church needs an updated Corporate Authorization Form on file at the bank. This form authorizes individuals to do business on behalf of the church. After discussion, it was decided that there would be 6 people on the form. It was moved by Brent and seconded by Jack to pass the Corporate Authorization Form, motion passed unanimously.

Ron gave the trustees report, he knows there are some things that still need to be completed at the church. He is getting the parts from Todd to fix the bathroom at the parsonage. He is also taking care of the leak at the FLC. He said that upon investigation, the new HVAC unit was not installed properly, and so has been leaking around it. John Mann caulked around it to fix it for now, but Ron is waiting on a couple of estimates to come in to fix it permanently. Ron and Sheryle fixed the ceiling in the kitchen. Ed suggested to Ron that we maybe look for a new HVAC service once our contract with Chilltex runs out, it was suggested that we look into Steve and Ted's service.

Brent reported that he has been helping to get the church opened back up. He is pleased that so far, there hasn't been any complaints on the measures we've taken so that we could have service.

Pastor Stephen didn't have much to report other than General Conference has been postponed until August 2021.

Old Business: The church modernization was discussed: Deb Elliott said she has a tv that she would donate, someone needs to reach out to her and see if that is still the case. The organ has been offered to Grace Lutheran, it sounds like they are going to take it pending final approval from their council.

We need a new church historian. Tom Woodruff has been asked, Stephen is waiting to hear back from him.

There was discussion about the new rules to use the FLC exercise room. Amanda has received some pushback on the rule of no gym use, and wanted to discuss with council how to best handle the situation. After much discussion, it was decided that the church would charge an extra \$5/month for gym use, and users would be required to sign a separate release form for any kids who might be using the gym, and NO ONE may use the gym on Wednesday evenings during the prayer meeting. Wendy moved and Emily seconded, motion passed. Amanda will reach out to users and let them know of the change.

New Business. The prayer group will be restarting on June 17th at the FLC. John Jenson reached out to Ed, he will be trying to put in a larger a/c unit at the Food Pantry. Vic Hurley reached out to the church, he would like to help out with weeding and trimming at the church, if possible.

With no other business before the council, Ed closed the meeting with a prayer. The next council meeting will be July 9th at 7pm in the fellowship hall.

JCUMC COVID-19 Plan of Actíon

Due to the recommended restrictions and best practices from the Governor, health officials, and the West Ohio Conference of the UMC, the Jackson Center UMC has developed the following plan of action to protect our parishioners, staff, and facilities. While these are recommendations rather than directives, we sincerely hope that all who enter our facilities will abide by our wishes. Thank you for your understanding and recognizing the needs of others.

- The building is being cleaned and sanitized with the best resources we have available.
 We ask you do your best to keep the facility clean & report any area of concern.
- 2. If you are not feeling well, we would ask that you stay at home until feeling better.

 (Note: Pastor Stephen's message will continue to be on our Facebook page.) You must NOT be symptomatic before entering for worship or other meetings. Avoid contact with other people within reason and check your temperature frequently. Get adequate sleep, eat well-balanced meals, and hydrate to ensure a healthy immune system.
- gathering to the Phase-In recommendations from health officials, the Governor, and the Bishop. On May 4th we will limit any gathering to 10 or less. Beginning with our anticipated opening date of May 24th, we will try to limit our gathering size to 50 or less. Then, when we are released to Phase 3, there will be no limitations on gathering size.

- These dates and numbers are subject to change.
- Clean and disinfect any frequently touched objects or surfaces.
- 5. Avoid exposure to those who are ill, especially if they show signs of respiratory symptoms. If you are their caregiver, please remain at home for at least 5-10 days after their improvement before going out.
- 6. Cover coughs and sneezes with your elbow, arm, or a tissue. Dispose of tissues in a trash receptacle.
- 7. Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. (Sing the Traditional Doxology or Happy Birthday for time).
- 8. Frequently use the hand sanitizer that is available throughout the church, especially if you are unable to wash your hands.
- 9. Maintain physical distancing of 6 feet when possible. Greet others from a distance and avoid personal contact such as hand shaking and hugs.
- 10. To assist in maintaining the physical distancing, we will be temporarily marking every other row in the sanctuary as "Do Not Sit." You may need to move from your normal spot and we ask that you only share the open rows with your family. We know that isn't always possible so, if you sit with others, we ask that you sit at the end of the rows when possible.
- 11. Extra tissue boxes and trash receptacles will be available throughout the building. Please use and dispose immediately after use.
- **12.** We will be removing the pew Bibles and Hymnals from the rows for disinfecting and not

- replacing them during these restrictions.
- 13. With the hymnals removed from the rows, we will use the screens/monitors for the words to hymns and rituals. Anyone wishing to have music, there will be copies of the weekly hymns available at the entrances.
- 14. We will continue the use of the pre-packaged juice and wafers for communion at least through July and then look at alternative methods of sharing communion until we can be safe with the intinction method again.
- **15.** While not requiring anyone to do so, we strongly urge all in attendance to wear a mask while inside the building. We have many older generation members who are more at risk and we want to make the surroundings as safe as possible for every person in attendance. Hopefully, you can bring your own, but if not, the church is having some cloth masks made. If you use one of these, please take it home with you for reuse. They are washable as needed.
- **16.** We will not be passing the offering plate during services. We will have the plates placed near the doors for you to drop in your offering. Remember that we now offer on-line giving so you can eliminate the handling of envelopes, checks, and extra cash. You can set up an auto payment weekly, monthly, or use as a one time payment. It is safe and easy to do once you establish an account. This is a time when we need you to remember your tithes and offerings to your church as our reserves are dwindling due to a lack of services. In addition, money counters will be supplied with continued on page 5

- hand sanitizer and requested to maintain proper distancing when counting. We urge those counters to use all precautions necessary when handling the money and envelopes (i.e. avoiding licking of fingers before counting checks or cash.)
- 17. Ushers will be available before the service to assist with reminding and offering of masks, helping you to locate the hand sanitizer, and pointing out the offering drop. They will **not** be handing out the bulletins or hymn handouts but can show you the location to pick one up.
- 18. Restrooms are small and until Phase 3 of opening, we ask that no more than 1 person at a time use the facilities. Disinfectant wipes will be made available to wipe down door handles and surfaces.
- 19. A checklist for safe food handling is posted in the kitchen for anyone using those facilities. We ask that you follow all recommendations when preparing or serving food.
- 20. Normal office hours have resumed as of Monday, May 4, 2020 but we ask that you call for an appointment before stopping in. The doors may be locked during office hours so calling is necessary to ensure entry.
- 21. In-home and hospital visits will be limited to a phone call, Zoom visit, or prayer chain requests. Anyone wishing a virtual visit should call the church office to request a call or prayer. Do not assume someone is aware of your need. Due to any possible health risk to our staff and/or the patient, there will not be any physical visitation until restrictions are lifted for hospital visitation.

22. Adult Sunday School classes may meet if social distancing is observed but we strongly urge those to consider your surroundings before deciding. Pre-school class through Senior High Teens will not meet and we appreciate your patience as we phase back into those younger classes in the future.

We expect and prayerfully hope these changes are for a short period of time but the recommendations will remain in place until more restrictions are lifted and we are confident on establishing a "new normal" for our church. It is important to remember that WE are the church and not the building. Communicate with friends and family to help those in need of assistance, especially the older members of our community. We are responsible for the ministry of the church and we need you more than ever to pray, care, and support your local church and her family. Consider encouragement of others by positive messages, cards, or calls. More than ever during this occurrence, we need to be the hands and feet of Christ. Thanks for your understanding and cooperation!
